Proposed Deputation by the Very Reverend Geoffrey Marshall, Convenor of the Derby & Derbyshire Friends of Hebron (and a Council member of the Britain Palestine Friendship and Twinning Network).

Setting up a twinning link with a place in Palestine may not be easy, but thoroughly worthwhile. Britain keeps talking of a Two State Solution to the Israeli-Palestinian impasse, but only recognises one of those states. Twinning is a way of beginning to put that right.

In 2014 the then Mayor of Derby went to Hebron - a city about the same size as Derby - to set up a twinning link. Hebron is one of the world's oldest continuously inhabited cities; it lies in the Palestinian Territories occupied by Israel since 1967. Derby & Derbyshire Friends of Hebron aims to raise awareness about the serious difficulties of daily life, including human rights violations, experienced by the people of Hebron. It also aims to break down widespread negative stereotypes of Palestine and its people and promote an understanding of its history and current circumstances. It tries to do this by establishing links between Derby and Hebron organisations, including schools and young people (22 of us from Derby raised funds for and visited two Hebron schools in 2019), trade unions (several trade unions have Palestinian solidarity policies), sports groups (at least one signed football has been taken by Derby County Football Club to a Hebron football team), religious groups, women's groups and environmental groups (we have made excellent links with the Palestinian Museum of Natural History); and just this week we have been invited by Hebron University (the oldest in Palestine) to set up formal links with the University of Derby (one of Britain's youngest).

We have held regular public meetings, sponsored walks and cycle rides, Palestinian meals and film and music evenings in and around Derby; and we have hosted Palestinian speakers, dancers and musicians. Of course the pandemic meant a break in visits in both directions, but we kept in touch by zoom meetings and fund-raising. We in Derby (and in Hebron) commend your initiative.

I am not a politician; I want to reiterate that any such twinning is never between politicians (of any particular party in either city); it is between two cities and their peoples. I want to remind you that it is not anti-Semitic to criticise some of the policies of the State of Israel. There are many Jews in Britain (and in Israel too) who are deeply troubled by some actions of the State of Israel; who see 55 years of Occupation of the West Bank as morally indefensible; who see the siege of Gaza and the wars against its people as crimes; who believe Jerusalem must be a shared city; who don't want to build their Jewish identity around racist Zionism; who oppose Israel's Nationality Law as bad for both the Jewish diaspora and for Palestinians; and who are very upset by the latest attacks against Palestinian civil society organisations.

When I take people to Israel/Palestine and when we twin with a Palestinian city I reckon we do so in solidarity with those whose freedom has been denied by war and despair; also in penance for Britain's broken promises and historic responsibility for injustice; and I do so with all who work for peace, reconciliation and justice, in the hope that all who call the land home will one day live as neighbours with equal rights.

Despite my peculiar title, which relates to me having been a Cathedral Dean in Wales, I am not backing your bid today as a religious leader but as a human being like yourselves. But a sizable minority of Palestinians, even in Gaza, are Christians; in fact Gaza's main hospital is an Anglican institution. I am certainly not anti-Jewish; Jesus was a Jew; he was also a Palestinian. I am not anti-Israel; in fact several years ago I was a proud winner of an Israeli Government award for services to tourism; but I am anti-Occupation and against anyone who commits war crimes or profits by them. I join you today daring to represent the quarter of a million people of Hebron and the quarter of a million people of Derby in supporting the idea of two bigger and even more important cities doing the same thing.

The city of Gaza has existed since at least the 15th century BC. The city of Edinburgh has been recognised as the capital of Scotland since at least the 15th century AD. Two proud cities with populations of rather over half a million. Gaza is known for too many negative things – I hope its future relationship with Edinburgh will help it be rightly famous for its hand-woven carpets, wicker furniture, pottery and fresh seafood. Gaza has a very young population, with roughly 75% under the age of 25. *Time Out* magazine has rated Edinburgh the best city in the world in 2022; it would surely rate Gaza as one of the worst. The Festival and Fringe capital of the world could be her wonderful friend.



Proposal to twin Edinburgh with Gaza City

Thank you for your invitation to submit a written statement for the Policy Committee to consider.

The Dundee-Nablus Twinning Association (DNTA) is happy to explain the benefits we see from our twinning with a Palestinian city and to encourage further twinnings with Palestine.

DNTA is proud of our city's long-standing link with our twin city of Nablus in Palestine. The relationship is positive in both directions. Dundee Councillors in 1980 made a very difficult decision to twin and they faced considerable opposition.

Our links are very much about friendship, understanding and commerce; they are not about (party) politics. We endeavour to understand each other and we value the human bonds which can be built by contact and hospitality. All Dundee City Council group leaders recognise this and have recently expressed their support for this twinning.

The origins of twinning after the wars in the 1940s were in bringing together those who had been in conflict. Twinning is by its nature often controversial or difficult but this is where it can be at its best. Building understanding is important to us all.

DNTA was established by Dundee City Council (with a Twinning Association created for each of the City's twins). The Lord Provost is an ex officio member of our committee and, subject to satisfactory examination of our accounts, the Council grants us £1,000 per annum. We raise a similar amount from our membership dues and fundraise for specific projects. We are independent and, of course, we do not speak for Dundee City Council or the Lord Provost.

Our activities include promoting friendship, understanding and commerce. We encourage and support visits between the two cities. Together with the other Twinning Associations, we support the Lord Provost when he holds twinning events.

A key role is to help the people of Dundee to learn more about Nablus and the people who live there.

Zoom meetings have recently become more popular and have enabled people in Nablus to meet and talk to our members and friends in Dundee.

Nablus was a contentious twinning when it was proposed in 1980. There was a petition to Parliament and many objections. But twinning is a positive move and is not exclusive or discriminatory. We now find there is widespread support for our twinning and very few objections.

This is welcome because twinning with your "friends" is not as beneficial as twinning with those people you do not know well; many twinning relationships after the wars of the 1940s helped to establish new and constructive understandings between former enemies.

Dundee-Nablus Twinning Association would encourage further links with Palestine. Our experience, though sometimes facing difficulties, is very positive and beneficial.
