Housing, Homelessness and Fair Work Committee 27 February 2024 Item 7.5 – Increasing Affordable Homes Delivery

Adds:

1.2 Recognises that, given these challenges - and in addition to a need for increased grant funding from the Scottish Government - a new approach to financing social housing might be required.

1.3 Notes that, following a request from Committee in October 2023, a briefing note was circulated to Councillors explaining options for supplementing the HRA with funds from the General Fund, and notes that 3 of the 6 budgets submitted to the Full Council meeting on 22nd February 2024 included proposals to do this in order to bring void properties back into use.

1.4 Notes that the ability to transfer funds into the HRA from the General Fund requires approval from the Scottish Government, and that in late 2023 / early 2024, the Scottish Government had indicated that, for this consent to be given, a number of questions would need to be answered by the Council, including about the purpose of the transfer, public consultation plans for the proposal, resources involved (in both the General Fund and HRA), and details about what alternative funding options had already been considered.

1.5 Therefore, requests that officers further engage with Scottish Government officials to explore the questions raised in 1.4 and identify the parameters around when approval for the transfer of funds would and would not be given (with particular focus on what purposes would be permissible for this, e.g. to bring voids back into use, to retrofit homes, etc), reporting back to committee in 2 cycles to allow political groups adequate time to build this into their budget plans for 2025-2026.

Committee adds;

1.1.5 Notes from the Internal Audit Ad Hoc Repairs, points -

2.4.9 To agree that this report will set out the reasons why there has been a failure of contract management and what specific actions are being taken in those service areas to bring contract management back in line.

2.4.14 To note a significant lack of processes and procedures to manage internal and contractor performance, check the quality of repairs, manage stock, approve invoices above the tolerance threshold or check completion of works; and that the lack of process puts the HRA at considerable risk and,

2.4.15 To agree that the Repairs Right First Time audit, alongside the previous audit on Mixed Tenure Repairs and the audit on Damp and Mould are referred to the Housing, Homelessness and Fair Work committee with a recommendation that monitoring of the audit management actions are included in the Housing Service Improvement Plan to monitor and secure best value for the HRA and improve services for tenants.

1.1.6 Requests that these interventions are incorporated into the Housing Emergency Plan and Strategy, and that future references from this audit are cross-referenced to avoid duplication, but highlight action.

Housing, Homelessness and Fair Work Committee 27 February 2024 Item 7.7 – Housing Emergency Action Plan

Adds:

1.1.5 Welcomes the work completed on the Action Plan to date, including the multiple workshops with different stakeholders to develop the plan.

1.1.6 Notes that, to date, these workshops have taken place in discrete sessions and not allowed for the “cross-pollination” of ideas between service areas, stakeholders and representative groups.

1.1.7 Therefore agrees that, as part of the next stage of work with the Housing Emergency plan, a Housing Emergency summit is held to discuss the plan with all stakeholders in one place, with a particular focus on exploring what outcomes are expected to be achieved in relation to the various different actions contained in the plan to date.

1.1.8 Further agrees that some consideration will be given to how members of the public can contribute their ideas / views about the plan in advance of this summit, with their ideas to be discussed during the summit too.

Additionally:

1.1.9 Notes a lack of detail in the plan concerning support available for tenants in the private rental sector, despite this comprising a significant percentage of the city’s housing stock and exorbitant rents putting tenants at risk of falling into rent arrears and homelessness, increasing pressures on the homelessness service.

1.1.10 Therefore agrees that additional actions will be added into the plan to look at how the Council can support private tenants as a preventative spend / action against homelessness – for example, by exploring options for reinstating the Tenant Grant Fund – and that these additions will be reported at the next Housing, Homelessness and Fair Work committee.

Housing, Homelessness and Fair Work Committee 27 February 2024 Item 8.2 – Support for Refugees, Asylum Seekers and Displaced People

Committee adds:

- 1.3 Notes that 24th February 2024 marked two years have passed since Russia's invasion of Ukraine and Edinburgh remains committed to being a welcoming city for everyone around the world fleeing persecution and where we can, will continue to work with Scottish and UK Governments, the third sector, relevant agencies, and residents, to offer constructive support to those escaping oppression. Further notes the Lord Provost and civic leaders continue to show solidarity with Ukraine and the Council continues to work with Governments for schemes to fund homes and other provision for refugees in addition to the work outlined in this report.
- 1.4 Notes its concern about the Home Office announcement on February 19th regarding the restrictions to family visas for Ukrainians ('Ukraine Family Scheme'), particularly on behalf of the of the Ukrainian community who have either settled or are residing in Edinburgh, but welcomes the 18-month visa extensions.
- 1.5 Requests the Convenor liaise with the Council Leader to write to the Secretary of State for Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Affairs highlighting the success of the Welcome Hub since February 2022 and outlining the Council's opposition to the new restriction, requesting a recommencement of the Ukraine Family Scheme.
- 1.6 Requests a Business Bulletin update is provided to the Housing, Homelessness and Fair Work committee in three cycles updating Councillors on the status of the Welcome Hub, the work it continues to do to welcome refugees, and how it could also adapt to further global crises.
